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Westwood Heights Skilled Trades Program

The Westwood Heights Skilled Trades Program is up and running. I interviewed the program instructor, Mr. Skeeter Holmes, for an update. Holmes currently holds an associates, bachelors, masters, and doctorate degree and has been working in construction for many years. I asked him to explain how the skilled trades program got started at Westwood Heights. “It started with an idea of what we could do to help our students who may not attend college to learn a skill that would benefit them.” Holmes went on to say that his involvement came from a sense of purpose. “I became a skilled trades teacher because there was a lack of good tradesmen so I decided to become a part of the solution and not the problem.” He enjoys



sharing his skills, talents, and abilities with his students.

I asked Holmes what the requirements are for being accepted into the program. “The first requirement is a desire to be a part of it. You need to want to learn new skills and trades.” Good attendance, behavior, grades, and a positive mindset are also important. There are 9 modules that must be completed. “The testing most skilled trades students participate in are the core curriculum tests. They’re easy if you stay focused and pay attention.” Holmes explained some of the benefits for participating students. “Students can receive stipends after passing each test module. They can earn up to 37 college credits upon completing the program.”

Currently, the students are working on building another float inside an Academy West classroom. “We recently built a float for the homecoming parade.” This float is displayed in front of Academy West.

Holmes’ vision for the future of the Skilled Trades program involves partnerships, property development projects, and “having our own skilled trades building with classes to teach each trade.”

Before concluding the interview, I talked to some of Mr. Holmes’



students. Deonte Carter said he enjoys “experiencing things that I normally couldn’t get my hands on.” The class leader, Louis Brown, stated, “Mr. Holmes has taught me things like how to properly hammer, read blueprints, and perform basic construction skills.” The current class includes two females. I asked Azaria Tuggle if it was difficult being a female in the group. She said, “Sometimes it’s intimidating. I wonder if I can live up to the expectations.” As a current student myself, I am glad I took this opportunity to learn new skills and I’m anxious to learn even more.

Students interested in joining the class can speak with their building principal for instructions on how to complete the application. Meanwhile, take a drive by Academy West to see the finished float and stay tuned for our next completed project.

Message from the Superintendent

Dear Westwood Heights Family,

We are now past the midpoint of the school year and it has been quite eventful. Some of the highlights this year include:

- The opening of Hamady Elementary as a Preschool/Kindergarten building. The programs there continue to grow, and we expect that facility to be full by next fall.
- Our enrollment growth at McMonagle and Hamady has resulted in new classrooms being built and additional staff being added. We welcome our new team members, and thank you for joining the staff.
- We have added three Health Assistants to monitor our staff and students and help to keep us safe.
- Even before the tragedy at Oxford we had increased our security staff, including highly trained resource officers from the Mt. Morris Township Police Department.
- Our fall and winter sports teams have high rates of participation, and the new programs at McMonagle are well attended as well.

The biggest challenge we face is overcoming the learning loss experienced by our students during the periods of

virtual instruction. Many students across the country are one to two years behind academically, and we have introduced a number of programs to address this issue:

- We offer before and after school programs including a homework help line to support the students and parents.
- We will offer a more comprehensive summer school program, specifically tailored to address students who are struggling in various subject areas.
- Teachers have extended their workday by 30 minutes to help address students needing to make up work or who have missed time due to quarantine protocols.
- We have added additional interventionists and tutors to support the teaching staff in the areas of math and English/Language Arts.

We are proud of the resilience shown by our staff, students, and their families during these difficult times. We have all lost loved ones in the last two years, but we have continued the mission of supporting and developing our young people. On behalf of the Westwood Heights Board of Education, thank you for continuing to show faith and confidence in our district.

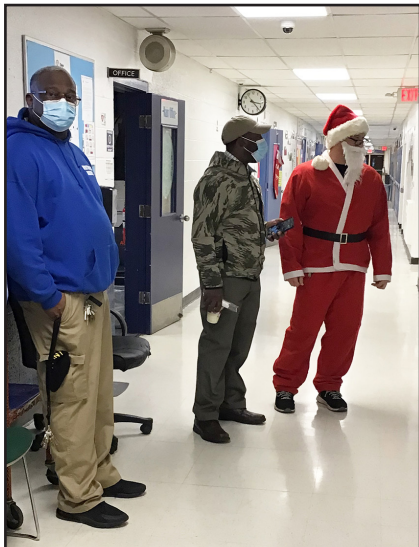
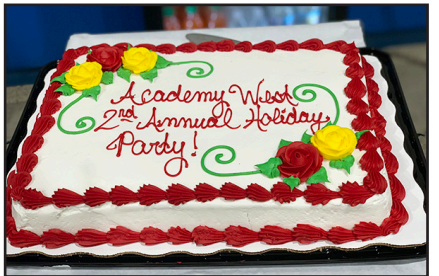

Teacher Spotlight: Ms. Ebony Thomas, Academy West Math Teacher

The sun streamed in through the classroom windows as Ms. Ebony Thomas and I settled in and prepared for this interview. For my first question I asked Ms. Thomas about her background. “I am a Flintstone graduate of Northwestern. I have a bachelor’s in Biology and I minored in Chemistry.” Thomas also has experience in research and medical diagnostics and animal husbandry. I wondered how she made the move from that to education. “I lost my job in the medical lab and started substitute teaching and selling Aflac insurance. One day, I popped into Academy West to try to get an Aflac account. I learned there was an open position and I happened to have a resume with me.” Thomas went on to say that she was quickly hired to be Student Support in the Plato Lab. Math is an integral part of biology and chemistry so she was a natural fit for assisting students with their math. Now, she is a full-time math teacher, a position that takes full advantage of her skills and background.

Next, I wanted to know about Ms. Thomas’s work with the Student Council at Academy West. She has been supervising that club for four years. Thomas believes that participation in student council “gives the opportunity to be a part of a family and helps students get prepared for life after high school.” Some of the activities the group has been involved in are helping with food distribution for the Foodbank of Eastern Michigan, taking part



in the Breast Cancer Awareness Walk, and attending the Renaissance Festival. Thomas remarked, “We shared a Friendsgiving meal together this year and held our second annual Holiday Party which were both very successful.” When I asked her about future plans for Student Council, Thomas said that she would like to see the group continue to grow and reach out to the community in meaningful ways. Since Covid has had such a big impact on education, I asked her if the pandemic had affected the ability of students to participate in activities. “Of course, I would feel terrible if I took the students to an event and someone got sick.” Thomas said. “We follow all the safety guidelines and plan accordingly.”

Thomas is always learning something new. She loves cooking, decorating, and finding super deals. She has completed Esthetician school and is currently taking classes in Massage Therapy.

Fundraiser

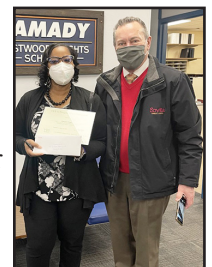

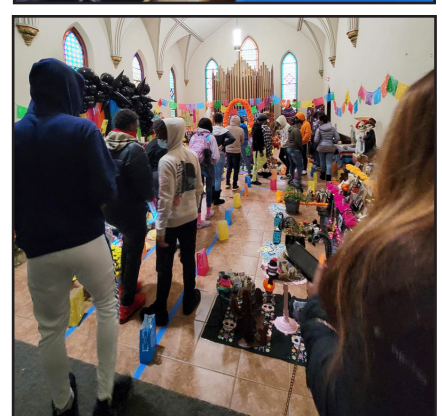
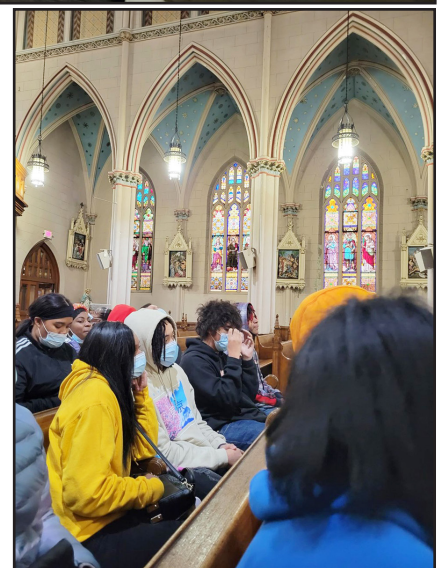
Continue to hang in there, we are halfway through the school year! Stay safe and keep on being the awesome parents/guardians that you are! I truly appreciate you.

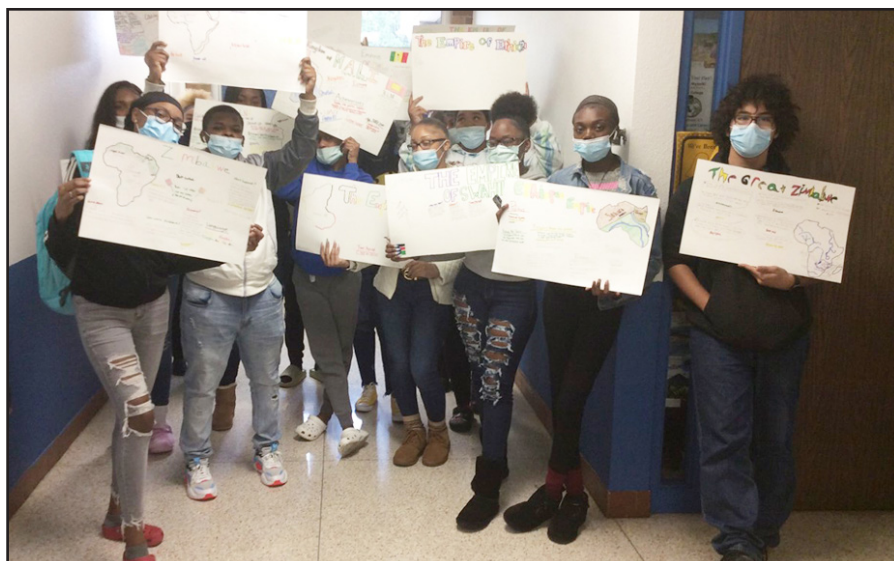
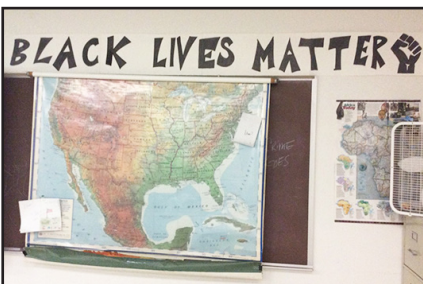
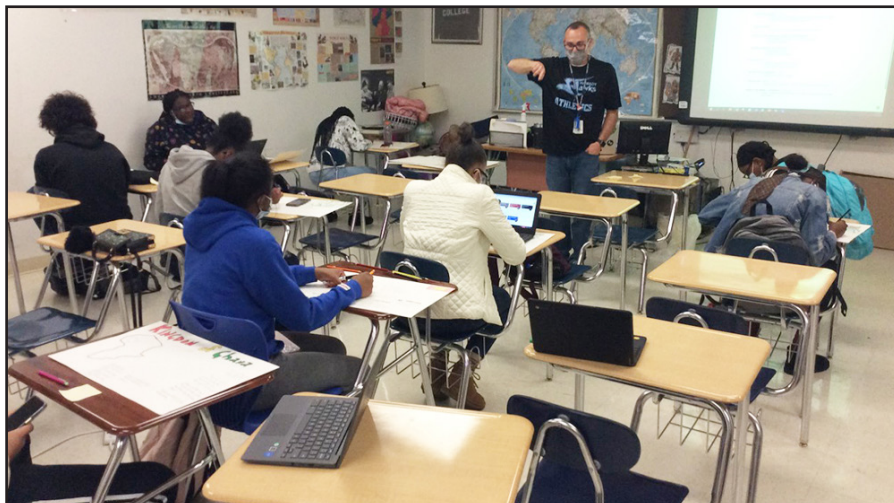

"It's a way of supporting students even outside of the classroom and attending to their basic needs, especially during breaks and holidays, said Superintendent Peter Toal."

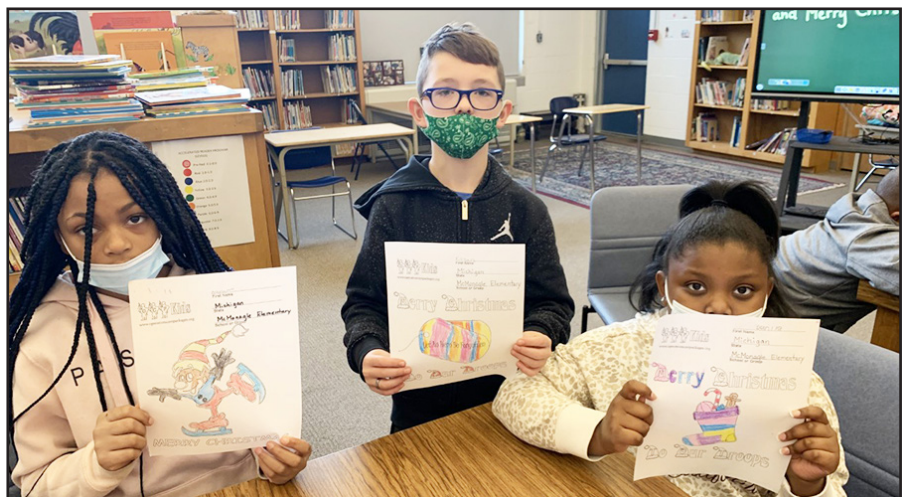
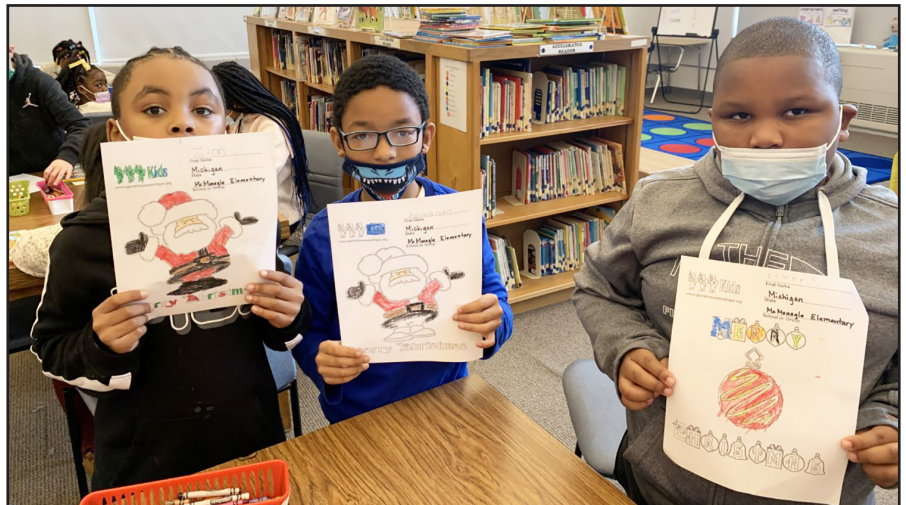
